Chair's report

For the whole of the past year, WCVA has been preparing to move house, and make new friends.

The property group, which consisted of officers and members of the executive, met once a month, to arrange to buy Baltic House, in Cardiff Bay, and two semi-detached houses in Wynnstay Road, Colwyn Bay. Director's introduction

This report covers an historic year for Wales with the creation of the National Assembly.

In March, we set out our vision of an Assembly when we launched our manifesto, *Our Design for Life*.

We called for an Assembly

- ... Which is willing to experiment and let others lead where they are best placed to do so
- ... which places the voluntary sector at the heart of its thinking...because it can develop ideas today which provide answers for tomorrow
- ... which enters into real not token partnerships
- ... which puts its money where its mouth is....and which turns rhetoric and loud words into reality.

We have spent much of this year, working with the Assembly, to try to turn this vision into reality

- through the setting up of the Assembly-Voluntary Sector Partnership Council
- through ensuring that the voluntary sector can influence policy at its inception
- by examining better ways of improving the funding of the sector
- by establishing partnerships on an equal basis.

Significant progress has been made in establishing these firm foundations but we now need to use these inclusive processes to develop and deliver the services people need, and the role and contribution of voluntary and community action in Wales.

Steps along this road has been the investment in volunteering through the Active Community Strategy, the beginnings of Communities First, and the measures agreed for European funding over the next six years.


Finally, a review of WCVA was undertaken during the year which concluded that


Partnerships in principle and practice – working with government

The National Assembly for Wales' (NAW) commitment to partnership has provided the key theme to WCVA's policy work through the year. The Assembly has set a new policy agenda to create a Better Wales, and this is reflected in policies and initiatives encompassing sustainable development, public health, lifelong learning, social inclusion, the giving age, and the new European programmes.

The voluntary sector has an important contribution to make this agenda. It is close to communities and residents, and to service users and carers. It is able to challenge and campaign on the basis of their needs. It has the capacity to innovate, to pioneer new approaches, and to provide services that give people choice, diversity and the opportunity to participate and make a difference. It has particular relevance to people and communities who are excluded or disadvantaged. The debate about how this contribution is recognised and supported has been the key theme throughout the year.

Partnership Council

The National Assembly Voluntary Sector Partnership Council has provided the over-arching focus for this debate. Bringing together representatives of the major voluntary sector networks with Assembly Members and officials, it has begun to explore better ways of working together and making the most of the sector's contribution to a Better Wales.



The year ahead will begin to show whether or not partnership leads to positive action. This will mean improving the dialogue with the sector about new policies, a level playing field that enables the sector to lead where it is best placed to do so, and a more mature funding relationship that enables the ideas and imagination of the sector to inform spending plans and expenditure patterns.

The new partnership agenda, and in particular the "three thirds" model that is bringing together public, private and voluntary sectors as equal partnerships, is an exciting development. It can lead to new and joined up thinking, and to innovation...

The voluntary sector scheme

The scheme – required under section 114 of the Government of Wales Act – is unique in the UK, and was formally adopted by the NAW in July 2000. Implementation of the scheme's recommendations will lead to regular meetings with Assembly Secretaries, involvement in policy-making decisions – and a more equal distribution of funding. The First Secretary has overall responsibility for the scheme, with the Voluntary Sector Partnership Council involved in monitoring progress on implementation




Local government

A series of practical seminars around Wales on best value and community planning have helped voluntary organisations understand and gear up for the new environment in which local authorities are operating, under the *Modernising local government* agenda. WCVA has also represented voluntary organisations on the cross-sectoral Wales Best Value Project Group, and on the Assembly's Working Group on Community Planning.

The development of local compacts has gathered pace during the year; a WCVA survey found that almost every local authority in Wales now has a compact in place, or has agreed a draft compact with the local voluntary sector. The compacts process has given added impetus to the Achieving shared aims initiative: two-thirds of authorities have established liaison structures with the sector, with links frequently made at the corporate and strategic levels.

New century, new influence - public policy and the voluntary sector

As the voice of the voluntary sector in Wales, WCVA lobbies decision-makers and influences policy development, putting the sector's case clearly and coherently. Above all, we strive to ensure this is a shared voice that accurately reflects the views of our members and other networks.

In addition to those issues highlighted below, WCVA has successfully promoted the sector's interests throughout the year, on issues as diverse as the review of the register of charities, trustee remuneration, and the charity tax review, in addition to the raft of NAW documents, including Better Wales.

Europe and Objective 1

1999 was a major transition year for European funding in Wales with the development of three completely new programmes. The largest fund now available is the £1billion Objective 1 programme for West Wales and the Valleys. WCVA's European team has been actively involved to an unprecedented degree in both the drafting of the new programmes, and in representing the sector during negotiations with the Commission.

The aim, as ever, was to maximise the voluntary and community sectors' potential contribution to economic and social regeneration. The success of this representational and lobbying work will become increasingly evident in years to come, but WCVA has already secured:

- Equal representation for the sector on the influential *programme monitoring committee*;
- equal representation for the voluntary sector on local and regional partnerships;.
- the development of a *regional package* that will provide the infrastructure and support to grass roots organisations;
- £650,000 a year for the next seven years for a *small grants scheme* for the sector.

In addition, potential hardship for many voluntary organisations has been averted through WCVA's campaign for 'gap funding'; £650,000 was secured for organisations facing difficulties due to the gap between the wind-down of the old programmes and the delay to the start of the new ones.

Sustainable development



An issue which has 'come of age' during the Assembly's first year, sustainable development is firmly on the political agenda. WCVA has brought together the voluntary sector *sustainable development forum*, which consists of key voluntary sector networks from the fields of community economic development, environment, social and cultural activity. The Forum's document *Sustaining the new Wales* elicited widespread interest and cross party support. It also produced a comprehensive response to the Assembly's consultation document *Learning to live differently*.

Lifelong learning

Getting this message over to decision-makers so that the sector is fully involved in initiatives on lifelong learning has been a priority. WCVA submitted papers to the NAW's

Post-16 education and training committee on promoting real partnership with voluntary sector providers. Subsequently, representation was secured on several Assembly implementation groups. Tom Middlehurst addressed a successful conference on lifelong learning during the NAW consultation period, which helped to share information and promote debate.

Health and social care

An impressive number of new initiatives have been brought forward by the Assembly, including the major public health strategy *Better Health, Better Wales*. WCVA, with the health and social care network, has worked hard to ensure the sector is informed about key developments, and is represented on the plethora of new committees and working groups.

Early experiences of local health groups were explored at a conference that brought together voluntary sector representatives from local health groups, CVCs and national voluntary organisations. The event promoted valuable dialogue between these key groups and with Jane Hutt AM, who also attended. The NAW has agreed to support future events of this kind. A conference on the social services white paper, *Building for the Future*, also ensured voluntary sector views were fed back to the NAW.


A growing membership

WCVA's strength as the voice of the voluntary sector in Wales is firmly rooted in a diverse and flourishing membership. This year, membership has grown to over 800 – the highest ever.

We aim to provide value for money services, including information and advice, discounts on WCVA services and publications, and access to discounted services and products – computer software and telecoms for example – with external suppliers. This year, members saved in excess of £35,000 on discounted services.

The year's annual conference drew members together to focus on 'New ways, Third ways', with the then First Secretary Alun Michael AM MP giving the keynote address, and Secretary of State the Rt Hon Paul Murphy MP speaking after the conference dinner.

A record number of visitors and a record number of participating organisations made Llanelli 2000 a year to remember. Sbardun (Welsh for 'spur' or 'impetus for action') excels as a platform for the sector at one of Wales' most prestigious and popular events. First Secretary to the Assembly Rhodri Morgan AM MP officially opened the centre, which hosted a full daily programme of events, from the official launch of Meningitis Cymru, to cookery demonstrations and a performance by the Millennium Project Deaf Choir.

Leading edge research

Authoritative research underpins our lobbying and representational work, and enables us to spot trends and assess the impact of new changes. It has considerable impact on policy makers.

This year we published the third edition of the *Wales voluntary sector almanac: mapping the sector*, and key facts and figures, a summary version. These give the definitive facts about the sector in Wales – its income, size, human resources, classification – and has usefully demonstrated its dimensions. For the first time, grants from the National Lottery were included: "the decrease in individual giving since 1994 (£106m in total to 1997/8) is nowhere near offset by all the Lottery payments to the sector (£64m in total to 1997/8), never mind just the NLCB payments (£20m in total to 1997/8)". The Almanac, and other briefings and publications from WCVA, have been quoted extensively by AMs and MPs.

1999/2000 was the second year of the UK four nations project to develop the research capability of the voluntary sector, funded by the NLCB. As well as boosting our knowledge of the sector, a series of information sheets and guides were produced on *mapping the sector, secondary data sources, evaluating research, internet resources for Wales and assessing research needs*. The Wales voluntary sector research group held a successful conference in the summer of 1999.

Foundations for the future - building strong communities

Volunteering developments

Volunteering received a major boost this year with the launch of the National Assembly for Wales' Active Community Strategy. This initiative to encourage more people to volunteer in their communities is bringing a major investment of £2.1m to 25 volunteer bureaux around Wales, a new website of volunteering opportunities, and the development of a programme of risk assessment/management in volunteering.

Millennium Volunteering Festival

'Thank you!' was the theme of the annual volunteers week – which this year celebrated in Millennial style – as organisations and individuals up and down the country took the time to acknowledge the huge contribution volunteers make to all our lives.

A giant jigsaw was the centrepiece of the Volunteering Festival, made up of 'pieces' representing constituencies in Wales. It was assembled by AMs at a street party outside the Norwegian Church in Cardiff Bay, attended by hundreds of volunteers.

Millennium Volunteers programme

The number of young people attracted into volunteering rose steadily with the increasing success of Millennium Volunteers. Almost 1000 places have been funded through the Assembly supported programme, and an additional support worker has been employed to help organisations become more young-people friendly.

Youngsters learn to help each other

A GROUP of youngsters from Penarth Youth Project's Young People's Project have become the first in Penarth to sign up as Millennium Volunteers.

This is a one year full-time voluntary post

at Penarth Library, who want to contribute to their local community.

The Penarth Project has proved so successful that it is now looking for other areas of interest to young people, particularly those who are less able to benefit from traditional youth work, such as disabled teenagers, older people and young parents.

A grant of £12,700 will be used to develop the project in addition, reflecting the particular needs of young people in Penarth.

Penarth Library, NCS Wales, will provide the training and supervision, while the management of the post, and the recruitment of young people, will be the responsibility of the Penarth Project.

Make friends to help others

Money isn't everything for keen volunteers

In a bid to find volunteers for the charity sector, the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCS) has launched a new campaign to encourage young people to get involved.

The campaign, which is aimed at 15-18-year-olds, aims to highlight the benefits of volunteering, such as meeting new people, learning new skills and getting involved in their local community.

Pauline Barker, NCS chief executive, said: "Volunteering can be a great way to make a difference to your local community and to gain valuable experience and skills for your future career."

She added: "We hope that by encouraging young people to get involved in their local community, we can help to create a more positive and supportive environment for everyone."

The campaign includes a series of leaflets and posters, as well as a website and social media channels.




Skills for the sector

A number of new courses featured in this year's training programme, including a *partnership skills* course which was successfully piloted with north Wales CVCs. Over 90 per cent of both the published programme – which has expanded by 60 per cent since 1997 – and courses run in-house for other voluntary organisations received an excellent/very good rating. A pilot project looking at quality systems in voluntary organisations, PQASSO, and involving 27 organisations got underway during the year.

Several NTO projects came to fruition: *Management Matters*, a report of an action research project into voluntary sector managers' needs, highlighted several key areas of concern. A second major publication, *Faith and Hope don't run charities (trustees do)*, is a practical guide on trusteeship which has been eagerly purchased by voluntary organisations large and small, making it WCVA's number one best seller! In association with the VSNTO in England and Scotland, a number of publications on *Investors in People* were produced.

The VSNTO has also adopted a three year work programme (available



for download on the new bilingual website, (www.ntowales.org.uk); run several well-attended conferences; and reviewed and updated the popular database of trainers and consultants.

This year, WCVA played a leading role in setting up PAULO, the NTO for community based learning and development.

Media Resource Wales

A joint initiative with the Media Trust, Media Resource Wales is a new project aimed at helping voluntary organisations get their message across. The project has arranged a series of workshops on subjects such as what broadcasters are looking for, to interview skills training, and has started to match organisations with media advisors.

The media industry has responded very positively to the initiative. As well as the big guns in Welsh media – BBC, HTV, Western Mail & Echo etc – a significant number of PR companies and individuals have pledged to help charities through the scheme.

It has long been recognised that volunteering has an image problem. In the long term, this project may have an influence on the way people view volunteering: if anyone can broaden the appeal of volunteering, it is the communications industry.

New Deal

"This scheme is an excellent example of what can be done when the Government and the voluntary sector work together. Young adults who previously would have been left on the dole are getting the chance to gain real experience and training in totally new ways." (David Hanson, MP)

WCVA has successfully managed the Employment Service contract on behalf of a consortium of voluntary organisations in north Wales to deliver the voluntary sector option since 1998.

This year, nearly 300 young people have joined the scheme, gaining quality work experience training in placements from admin to zoo keeping, circus skills to soccer skills, performing arts to pastoral care. Each trainee works to a personal development plan and has an individual training plan – achieving at least the equivalent of two NVQ 2 units.



"Martin is working directly with full-time staff, really learning the craft of zoo keeping – everything from mucking out to skilled animal husbandry", says the zoo's administrative director, Chris Jackson. "It's interesting but hard work. You need to be particularly dedicated – lots of people think they love animals until they have to work with them in awful winter weather and through all hours". The zoo has already taken on another trainee, Chantal Adams, as a fully-fledged zoo keeper.

Participation

The Jigso project continues to promote the use of participation techniques in rural Wales. Training courses on participatory appraisal and on community appraisals were run for trainers, while the Camelot-Jigso grant scheme has distributed over £66,000 to events and activities in over 90 communities.





Tea time at the Welsh Mountain Zoo in Colwyn Bay and unemployed teenager Martin Williams gains valuable experience as a trainee keeper.

Quality and quantity *- information and advice services*

- WCVA responded to over 9,000 queries across the organisation;
- over 40 editions of current awareness were published;
- nearly 700 funding queries were dealt with;
- the all-Wales database of voluntary organisations held over 21,000 entries by the end of the year;
- more information on policy, events, news, funding etc was added to our website www.wcva.org.uk in downloadable form.

The Millennium edition of the National voluntary organisations in Wales directory included over 500 entries, 25 per cent more than the previous edition. This is also the first fully bilingual edition, and includes press contacts and www addresses.

In addition, specialised information and advice services were provided for the sector:

Network Wales

This year, the sector's magazine underwent a transformation in design and frequency. Now completely bilingual, *Network Wales* is published twice a month, allowing for more up to the minute news coverage, and has switched from an A4 to tabloid format.

"It's bright, easy to read and informative", was Margaret Minchinick's response,

while David Murray of Age Concern Gwent said the new format *"is easy to use and eye-catching"*.



Estyn – support and advice for community buildings

Over the year, the service has:

- Responded to over 400 requests for information;
- published 11 new information sheets and 5 editions of the Estyn newsletter;
- held two national forum meetings for community buildings;
- advised individual local authorities on the content and wording of new leases between themselves and community centres;
- helped establish 4 new local forums for community buildings, bringing the total in Wales to 14 (only 2 were active in 1997);
- final amendments were agreed on the Performing Rights Society's new Tariff CC (halls/centres with an income of £15k or less are likely to see a reduction in the royalties they pay);
- Estyn lobbied on behalf of community buildings in Wales on issues including water charging, criminal record checks, and the interpretation of 'mixed trade' by the Charity Commission.

Voluntary sector Assembly centre (VSAC)

The NLCB funded centre, launched in September 1999, and designed to be the first port of call for the sector in its dealings with the Assembly, provides meeting facilities, a hot desk for callers needing access to the Assembly website or simply to catch up on work away from the office, and a wealth of other information, including:

- a weekly bulletin containing details of Assembly activities, which is posted on the WCVA website, (www.wcva.org.uk/Assembly) emailed, faxed and posted to nearly 1,000 people;
- details of committee membership, activities and documents, via the website or on request;
- a library of video recordings of Assembly sessions, available for loan;
- a general information service on Assembly matters, which dealt with 1200 enquiries in its first year;
- servicing the network of voluntary sector Assembly workers;
- briefings on request to organisations on Assembly matters.

Two VSAC/WCVA publications were produced: *Dance with the dragon – a guide to devolution in Wales for UK based organisations*, and *Devolution in practice – a practical guide for voluntary organisations*.



In the latter part of the year, an AM volunteering scheme was launched, and 30 of the 60 AMs have already signed up to spend 10 days with a voluntary organisation over the next 18 months. The scheme is about rewarding exchange, and aims to offer AMs a greater insight into the problems and challenges the sector faces. They will see at first

hand how a professionally managed organisation tackles planning and budgeting, organises its volunteers, discharges its trustee responsibilities, copes with fluid funding and plans for challenges ahead – and all the while watching and reacting to the ever shifting public policy and legislative environment. Watch this space!



Funding for the sector, managed by the sector

WCVA's grant schemes support local voluntary organisations and voluntary action throughout Wales, with funding from the National Assembly for Wales, charitable trusts, lottery distribution bodies, and the European Commission. They have safeguarded and increased the overall funding available for the voluntary sector in Wales, giving local groups access to sources of funding managed within the voluntary sector (grant committee members are drawn from WCVA's executive), strengthening their independence from other sectors. In total, over 540 awards were made this year, totalling £9.3m.

Volunteering in Wales Fund

This fund supports activities that promote and develop volunteering in all parts of Wales. This year, 90 awards were made, totalling £556,500.

Mental health

WCVA was delighted to receive a boost of 5 per cent to this scheme, bringing the total amount available to £1.63m. This meant that the 38 local mental health services providers and 9 mental health development services supported by the scheme received an inflationary uplift that took account of the freeze on the scheme in the previous financial year. However, resources to fund the many excellent new applications coming in to the scheme in its third year have not been forthcoming.

Small grants

- can make a big impact! Over £30,000 was distributed to 37 groups. These awards helped pay for a children's play area, the replacement of instruments for a brass band, the costs of setting up a self help group for women suffering from depression and anxiety, and publicity materials for a neighbourhood watch group.

Trainees at The Women's Workshop, Cardiff Training Centre created this mosaic to mark the completion of courses they had taken. The project received £300 from WCVA's small grants scheme.



European grant schemes

European funding has always been notoriously difficult for voluntary groups to access. Small community groups in particular have so much to offer to local regeneration, but have been effectively shut out by the complex application processes. WCVA's umbrella schemes have provided grants of over £840,000 to 110 community groups working in rural Wales and in South Wales, from the European Social Fund and European Regional Development Fund.

One group to benefit is the Pillgwenlly Heritage Community Group in Newport, awarded £8,527 to promote the social and industrial history of Pill from the early 1800s. The group has already started work on a scale model of the community in the 1920s, which is to be filmed at street level and placed on CD-ROM to allow a virtual stroll through the community as it was then.



Local voluntary services scheme

The LVS scheme provides funding for the network of county voluntary councils (CVCs) that support local voluntary and community groups in every corner of Wales. £1.7m was distributed to 19 CVCs.

Millennium Volunteers

This scheme, which aims to encourage more young people to volunteer, has distributed 18 grants totalling £66,000 to coordinating bodies, and made 100 project grants totalling £350,000.

Cynnal – 21st century halls for Wales

This year saw Cynnal move towards completing its programme to build or refurbish 48 village and community halls. The £10m investment in community halls – the largest ever in Wales – will see 18 completely new halls, with the remainder extensions and refurbishment projects.

Cynnal – a ‘rip-roaring success’!


Margaret Jervis said the £10m Millennium Commission-funded project was a cause for celebration after helping refurbish 48 village and community halls.





And finally... this was the year we:



Daeth datblygu cynaliadwy 'i oed' yn ystod blwyddyn gyntaf y Cynulliad ac mae bellach wedi ennill ei blwyl ar yr agenda wleidyddol. 
Aelodaeth gynyddol

Mae gwaith ymchwil dibynadwy yn gweithreda fel sylfaen i'n gwaith lobio a chynrychioli, ac mae'n ein galluogi i weld tueddiau ac asesu effaith y newidiadau newydd. Mae'n cael effaith sylwedol ar unigolion sy'n llunio polisiau.

Eleni, bu i ni gyhoeddi'r trydydd rhifyn o *Almanac sector gwirfoddol Cymru: mapio'r sector, a feithiau a ffugrau allweddol, sef fersiwn cryno*. Mae'r rhain yn cynnws y feithiau swyddogol am y sector yng Nghymru – ei incwm, ei faint, adnoddau dynol, dosbarthiad – ac mae wedi dangos ei ddimensiynau mewn ffordd defnyddiol. Mae ACau ac ASau wedi dyfynnun i'w haethol o'r Almanac, ac o gyhoeddiadau a briffiau eraill gan CGGC.

Roedd rhifyn y Milenium o'r cyfeirlyfr Mudiadau gwirfoddol cenedlaethol yng Nghymru yn cynnwys dros 500 o enwau, 25% yn fwy na'r rhifyn cyn. Hwn hefyd yw'r rhifyn cyntaf cwbl ddwyieithog, ac mae'n



Mae'r cynllun yn ymweud â chyfnewid, a'r nod yw cynnig cipolwg mwy treiddgar i ACau i'r problemau a'r sialensiau y mae'r sector yn eu hwynnebu. Cânt weld, yn bersonol, sut y mae mudiad a reolir yn broffesiynol yn mynd i'r afael â chynllunio a chyllidebu, yn trefnu ei wirfoddolwyr, yn cyflawni cyrifoldebau eu hymddiriedolwyr, yn ymdopi â nawdd anwadal ac yn cynllunio ar gyfer y sialensiau sydd o'u blaenau – tra'n gwyllo ac yn ymateb i'r amgylchedd deddfwriaethol a'r polisi cyhoeddus bythol newidiol. Cadwch eich llygaid ar agor!

Nawdd ar gyfer y sector, a reolir gan y sector

Mae cylluniau grant CGGC yn cefnogi mudiadau gwirfoddol lleol a gwaith gwirfoddol ledled Cymru, gyda nawdd gan Gynlliad Cenedlaethol Cymru, ymddiriedolaethau elusennol, cyrff sy'n dosbarthu arian loteri, a'r Comisiwn Ewropeaidd. Maent wedi gwarchod a chynyddu'r nawdd cyffredinol sydd ar gael i'r sector gwirfoddol yng Nghymru, gan alluogi grwpiau lleol i fanteisio ar ffynonellau nawdd a reolir o fewn y sector gwirfoddol (dewisir aelodau'r pwylgor grant o bwylgor gwaith CGGC), gan eu gwneud yn fwy annibynnol ar sectorau eraill. Cyflwynwyd cyfanswm o £540 o grantiau eleni, gwerth cyfanswm o £9.3m.



Y Gronfa Gwirfoddoli yng Nghymru

Mae'r gronfa hon yn cefnogi gweithgareddau sy'n hybu ac yn datblygu gwaith gwirfoddol ym mhob rhan o Gymru. Eleni, cyflwynwyd 90 o grantiau, gwerth cyfanswm o £556,500.

Iechyd meddwl

Roedd CGGC wrth ei fod yn derbyn hwb o 5 y cant i'r cynllun hwn, gan ddod â'r cyfanswm sydd ar gael i £1.63m. Golygai hyn fod y 38 darparwr gwasanaethau iechyd meddwl a'r 9 gwasanaeth datblygu iechyd meddwl, a gefnogir gan y cynllun, yn cael hwb chwyddiannol a rodrai ystyriath i'r rhewi a welodd y cynllun yn ystod y flwyddyn ariannol flaenorol. Fodd bynnag, ni chafwyd adnoddau i noddi'r holl geisiadau newydd cyffrous ymae'r cynllun yn eu derbyn yn y drydedd flwyddyn.

Grantiau bychain

- gallant gael effaith fawr! Dosbarthwyd dros £30,000 i 37 o grwpiau. Helpodd y grantiau hyn i dalu am le chwarae i blant, prynu offerynnau newydd i fand pres, talu costau sefydlu grwp hunan-gymorth i fenywod sy'n dioddef o iselder ysbyryd a gwewyd meddwl, a deunydd cyhoeddusrwydd i grwp gwachod a gympoed.

Hyfforddeion yng Ngweithdy'r Menywod, Canolfan Hyfforddi Caerdydd a greodd y murluniau mosâg i nodi dwydded eu ocrws. Derbyniodd y prosiect £300 oddi wrth y cynllun grantiau bychain CGGC.

Cynlluniau grantiau Ewropeaidd

Mae nawdd o Ewrop wastad wedi bod yn arian anodd i grwpiau gwirfoddol gael gafael amio. Mae gan grwpiau cymunedol, yn arbennig, gynaint i'w gynnig i adfywi'r lleol, ond cawsant eu cau allan, i bob pwrpas, gan y prosesau ymglesio cymhleth. Mae cynlluniau ymbarél CGGC wedi rhoi grantiau o dros £840,000 i 110 o grwpiau cymunedol sy'n gweithio yn y Cymru wledig ac yn Ne Cymru, gan Gronfa Gymdeithasol Ewrop a Chronfa Datblygu Rhanbarthau Ewrop.

Un grŵp i elwa yw Grŵp Cymuned Treftadaeth Pillgwenlly yng Nghasnewydd, a gafodd

£8,527 i hyrwyddo hanes cymdeithasol a diwydiannol Pill o ddechrau'r 1800au. Mae'r grŵp eisoes wedi dechrau gweithio ar fodel wrth raddfa o'r gymuned yn y 1920au, caiff hwn ei ffilmio ar lefel y stryd a'i roi ar CD-ROM a gallwch fynd am dro rhithwir drwy'r gymuned fel ag yr oedd bryd hynny.

Cynllun gwasanaethau gwirfoddol lleol (LV5)

Mae'r cynllun LV5 yn rhoi nawdd i rwydwaith y cymghorau gwirfoddol sirol sy'n cefnogi grwpiau cymunedol a gwirfoddol lleol ym mhob cwr o Gymru. Dosbarthwyd £1.7m i 19 o'r cymghorau hyn.

Gwirfoddolwyr y Mileniwm

Mae'r cynllun hwn, sy'n ymdrechu i annog mwy o bobl ifanc i wirfoddoli, wedi dosbarthu 18 o grantiau gwerth cyfanswm o £66,000 i gyrrf cydlyn, a chyflwynasant 100 o grantiau i brosiectau gwerth £350,000.



Cynnal – neuaddau bro i'r 21ain ganrif yng Nghymru
